

AA1: Greening Construction with Sustainable Wood

- Co-leads: Canada, France, Kenya
- Interested Members: Australia, Costa Rica, Fiji, Finland, Germany, Ghana, Japan, Netherlands, Norway, Pakistan, Republic of Congo, South Korea, Tanzania, UK, USA

This issue is important because:

- The building sector accounts for 42% of GHG emissions;
 between 2023 and 2050 the number of buildings is estimated to double worldwide
- The use of wood in construction offers a win-win solution to the converging crises of deforestation and urbanisation and can help governments meet their NZ commitments

By the end of 2025, FCLP members will have:

- Advanced work to increase the capacity of forest monitoring systems to facilitate sustainable harvesting of timber for the buildings and construction sector;
- Developed guidance for including wood and bio-based materials in building codes
- Shifted public and sector perception of wood/bio-based materials in construction;
- Strengthened collaboration and information sharing across sectors to better facilitate sector transformation.

- Early Sept: Working Group to consider 3 concrete proposals to advance work in systemic collaboration and promoting wood culture & engaging societies
- CBD COP16 and/or UNFCCC COP29 (TBC): Roundtable of interested FCLP members with industry, private sector and NGOs to advance workplan and consider next draft of *Principles for Responsible Timber in Construction* and plan for potential future announcements



AA2: Debt Instruments and Approaches for Nature

Working Group leads: US and Colombia

This issue is important because:

- Countries are suffering from a triple crisis of unsustainable debt burdens escalating the costs of climate shocks and transition, and adverse economic impacts of climate change and biodiversity loss
- Many countries lack the fiscal space to act due to high debt service payments, reduced access to concessional financing, and high interest rate

By the end of 2025, FCLP members will have:

- •Built political support at a **high-level to** advance structural enabling conditions to use debt-related financial instruments to meet climate and nature targets.
- Increased understanding and sharing of information at a technical level on the types of sovereign debt instruments available for debtor countries.
- MDBs Advocated for DFIs, bilateral donors, shareholders to take part in these types of transactions for forest-related outcomes. This could include supporting the provision of more and better credit enhancement and convening of the private sector.

- Share Introductory Webinar recordings and material with members
- Organising a High-level convening with IMF and Credit Rating Agencies in New York
- Establishing a narrative on progress on the sovereign debt agenda for a panel within the High-Level event at CBD COP16



AA2: Country Packages for Forests, Nature and Climate

- Co-leads: Singapore and USA
- Interested Members: Colombia, DRC, Gabon, Ghana, Peru, Republic of Congo, Belgium, Canada, Denmark, EC, France, Germany, Norway, UK

This issue is important because:

 To support the development of ambitious forest, climate, and biodiversity goals, coordinated mobilisation of a range of partners providing financial, diplomatic, investment and technical solutions is required.

By the end of 2025, FCLP members will have:

- Prioritize follow-up on development and implementation of Country Packages announced at COP28, recognizing these are host countryled
- Support information- sharing around country packages process and key aspects addressed by countries.
- Continue to build global momentum and support for enhanced national action, through the global process on Country Packages.

- Convening the Packages Advisory Committee (9 Sept 2025) to help drive forward momentum and ambition of the global CP process and brand, and to help develop resource material
- Continue to convene quarterly International Working Group members which brings together host countries, partner countries, philanthropies, private sector, and MDBs to share updates, investment opportunities, etc
- Support host country-led events at COPs

AA4: Supporting Indigenous Peoples and local communities

- Co-leads: Norway and Peru
- Interested Members: Canada, Colombia, Costa Rica, Denmark, DRC, Ecuador, Fiji, Ghana, Germany, Kenya, UK, USA.

This issue is important because:

- The 2030 target can only be achieved by protecting IPs and LCs lands, which occupy 50% of the Earth's terrestrial surface.
- IP&LCs have demonstrated deforestation rates between 17 and 26% lower on average compared to unprotected tropical forests globally but need greater protections and support in order to continue preserving the forests.

By the end of 2025, FCLP members will have:

- An operative Platform to support IP&LC in Forest and Climate Action with the Forest Tenure and Founders Group and GATC
- A political moment at COP30 which brings together increased global ambition on land tenure recognition and increased global ambition for funding it.
- Supported a number of FCLP members, technical and financially, to develop domestic policies which support IPs and LCs.

- Support the development of a Global Pledge on # hectares of land recognised.
- Work with the FTFG and other stakeholders on alignment with a new financial pledge for forest tenure 2.0.
- Support the development of Global South Countries policy priorities.



AA5: Strengthening and Scaling Forest Carbon Credits and Results

- Co-leads: Ghana, Guyana and the UK
- Interested Members: Australia, Colombia, Costa Rica, DRC, Ecuador, Fiji, France, Germany, Kenya, Netherlands, Nigeria, Norway, Pakistan, Peru, RoC, Singapore, Tanzania, USA, Vietnam.

This issue is important because:

- Drastically more finance for forest mitigation action is needed, and quickly.
- Forest Carbon Credits and Results have the potential to provide a significant revenue stream for forest countries to invest in development pathways that do not depend on the clearance of forested land.
- Building a shared understanding of how to strengthen forest carbon credits/results globally is essential to fulfilling that potential.

By the end of 2025, FCLP members will have:

- Elevated the issue of demand for forest carbon credits and results to the top of the political agenda at all levels
- Influenced the international community, including the private and finance sector, to increase the demand towards RBPs and VCM and integrating forest carbon into compliance markets by communicating and positioning positive examples of where finance is flowing to forest protection outcomes.
- Ensure that forest countries are involved in setting the rules that will guide the market and clarify what claims are allowed by those investing in carbon markets
- Delivered practical initiatives to support scaling of high integrity credits.

- NYCW: Networking Breakfast with CSOs and Funders to discuss technical assistance for JREDD+
- NYCW: Evening Reception promoting the importance of JREDD+ to financing forests
- Co-leads to share background papers and political statement draft to be discussed in NY this September

- Germany proposed some ideas in 2023 but are waiting for a Global South country to come forward to work together on this area.
